Preparing for NCEA Changes

The government recently announced that NCEA changes have been postponed by a year, with Level 2 changes moving from 2025 to 2026, and NCEA Level 3 changes moving from 2026 to 2027. It continues to be a challenging time as schools prepare to implement changes to NCEA Level 1 for 2024. Currently, our main focus is preparing our students to sit the new literacy and numeracy assessments that are required to achieve any level of NCEA. It was interesting to read the following story which explains how more schools are now choosing to take an approach to NCEA Level 1 that Fairfield College took in 2018. New Zealand Schools Dropping NCEA Level 1. Once the teacher industrial action concludes we will organise meetings with our school community to discuss how Fairfield College is approaching NCEA Level 1 from 2024.

The Threat of a Measles Outbreak

With people travelling overseas again, there's a risk that someone with measles could unknowingly bring the disease back to Aotearoa. Measles spreads easily and quickly, usually between people who are unimmunised or only partially immunised. It can be serious and life threatening. In the 2019 measles outbreak in Aotearoa more than 30% of the people infected had to be admitted to hospital. The best protection against measles is the free MMR vaccine. It will protect you and your whaa nau, and prevent the virus from spreading.

You will be protected against measles if you:

- have had 2 doses of the MMR vaccine
- or have had measles before
- or were born before 1 Jan 1969

If you're unsure if you or your children have had any or both doses of the MMR vaccine, check by calling your GP or hauora provider. Alternatively, check your Plunket Well Child Tamariki Ora book. If you're still not sure, be safe and get immunised – there are no safety concerns with having an extra dose. MMR vaccines are free at your local health provider and many pharmacies. Next week we will be distributing a letter to the parents/caregivers of those students that are not listed on our MMR vaccination register. Below is an extract from a letter that was distributed in May 2016 when a measles case was detected in the school. This provides insight about how the matter may be handled if a future measles case was detected at Fairfield College.

POPULATION HEALTH

Date 16 May 2016

Dear Parent/Guardian/Staff

Information for contacts of a measles case

A student at Fairfield College has recently been reported to Waikato DHB's Population Health with measles.

Students and staff at the School may have been exposed to this infection. Measles is a serious viral infection; the early symptoms include fever, cough, runny nose, sore red eyes and white spots inside the mouth. After 3 to 5 days a rash appears on the face and then moves down the body. Occasionally measles has dangerous complications. Measles is highly infectious.

All students who have not had two doses of MMR vaccine (this will need to be documented either via school records, GP records or a Well Child Book) must stay at home in quarantine until Monday 23rd May, 2016.

- If your child has had 2 doses of MMR please provide documentation to school, if they do not already have it. They should be immune and there is no reason for isolation or keeping them away from school.
- If you are not sure of your child's immunisation records, check with your GP and keep you child at home in quarantine until you have the information that they have had 2 does of MMR. **PLEASE PHONE** your GP practice rather than visiting.
- If your child has had one documented dose <u>of MMR</u> (more than a month ago) please keep them at home in quarantine, make an appointment with your family doctor for the second MMR, and once received, they may then return to school.
- If your child has received no documented doses of MMR then they are required to be quarantined at home (see below) until Monday 23rd May, 2016 in accordance with the Health (Infectious and Notifiable Diseases) Regulations 1966.





On Friday 12th May 2023

we had the privilege of hosting eight alumni students who attended Fairfield College from 1963 - 1969, they came from all around New Zealand and overseas.
